Q & A

Q1. I was taken aback to learn via the Resident Council Meeting Minutes that the Yellow House, formerly the Housekeeping/Environmental Services offices, is now being leased to Golden Bond Rescue with no Rose Villa control over what happens there. I am very concerned about this, especially that the residents whom this most affects were not consulted.

Will this be an outdoor kennel? I'm concerned about noise from dogs, the odor and health consequences of dog waste and, as not really a "dog person," I do not want to live among them or hear them. Any information you can provide is helpful.

A. Thank you for bringing your concerns to us! We appreciate that not everyone is a dog-lover.

The opportunity to temporarily lease the house to Golden Bond was discussed in the Resident Ideas Round Table work last year, which produced many viable suggestions from residents on how to use our empty common spaces. The only other use for the house is to board it up, which is undesirable.

The house itself will be used as an office. There will be no kenneling of dogs on the property. The business facilitates dog fostering and adoptions, and it is not a shelter facility. No more than one or two dogs will be on the property at any given time, and they will never be left unattended. There is also no provision for any Golden Bond staff or volunteers to live on the property although there may be occasions when a dog is not picked up and must remain overnight. If this occurs, a volunteer will stay overnight so the dog is not alone. There are limitations written into the lease agreement to ensure this is not a regular occurrence.

To answer your concerns about control, Rose Villa retains sole and total control of the property, not Golden Bond. If any issues arise, Rose Villa will address them. The month-to-month term of the lease, with both parties able to cancel with 30 days' notice, ensure that we will be able to immediately address any issues. Given the size and location of the property, as well as the way Golden Bond will be using it, we do not anticipate our residents will experience any changes or disruptions. But please let us know immediately if you do!

For more information about Golden Bond, you can also contact Joan Clark, who has history with the organization and is chair of the Resident Pet Committee. She is a great resource.

Q2. Is Golden Bond paying market rate for the house they are leasing?

A. The rate Golden Bond is paying is equitable to both them and Rose Villa.

Q3. Can the palm trees in the lot next to the parking area along River Road be saved from the steam shovel?

A. While the palm trees do not meet Rose Villa's landscaping policy for native plants, they are not currently scheduled for removal.

Q&A from the floor

LANDSCAPING

Q1. When will the landscaping around Trillium Townhomes be complete? We have been told not to do any planting until the contractor is finished. What is the timeline on this, and when can we start planting?

- A. The contractor is under a maintenance contract with us for one year. We will be doing a walkthrough next month to determine the status of the common areas, which are anything outside the planters in front of your homes. You can plant them now! And as always, we are open to suggestions about what you would like to see planted in common spaces that Rose Villa will be managing after our contract with Colors NW has ended.
- Q2. What is the status of bamboo removal?
 - A. It continues. Most of the bamboo has been removed (we had to remove and replace some concrete patios and steps), and we are now "chasing" the bamboo shoots. They are petering out and we are hopeful that we will not have to remove any other structures. As bamboo is relentless, we may be on "shoot alert" and remaining vigilant for a long time.

Q3. What about the bamboo adjacent to the employee parking lot? And will they remove the dead birch tree in the yard of the house that will be demolished?

A. The bamboo is going to be removed. If there are dead trees or other plantings, they will also be removed.

Q4. Is this the same landscaping company we are trying to get rid of?

A. Technically, yes, we would like to see the end of our contract with Colors NW, but they remain under contract with us now and they will be doing judicious pruning and removal of plants at the property adjacent to the employee parking lot.

Q5. In the landscaping plans that were posted in the Lobby, there were oak trees that should have been planted near the new parking area and in The Commons. I do not see trees planted there. Where are they?

A. Those plans were drawn up well before Phase 3 started and, as any plans – especially landscaping – do, they changed. There were oak trees planted in other areas of campus.

CONCRETE/GENERAL CAMPUS

Q6. What is the status of the concrete that has been deteriorating?

- A. We will be doing a "concrete walk" to determine what needs to be repaired. Priority will be given to areas that have deteriorated to the point where they cause physical hazards.
- Q7. What is the status of the project in North Pocket to replace cracking concrete?
 - A. If there are cracks that cause physical hazards, please submit a work order and we will look at the area. Concrete is prone to cracking, due to its nature, so not all cracks will cause hazards.

Q8. I have a concern about the decking outside Schroeder Lofts. It is slippery when wet, as signage indicates. Are there plans to put in handrails?

A. At this time, we are putting down non-slip applications such as ice melt and gravel during inclement weather, and making sure the signage is obvious.

Q9. Recently, on my way to the other side of campus, I got stuck with my walker in an area that was too steep and had nothing to hang onto. I had to call for a surrey. Is there an inventory of non-accessible spots on campus?

A. You certainly did the right thing by calling for a surrey! As you can imagine, with our campus being built on a slope, not all areas are ADA-compliant. We

recommend you use the switchbacks (zig zags) in the Pocket neighborhood, as they are safer to navigate. Reminder that the surrey ramp opposite the South Main building and next to Cottage #64 is NOT designed for pedestrians and is very steep. We can certainly look at improving campus navigability.

Q10. What is happening with all the properties Rose Villa has purchased and why is it so slow to clean up?

A. We are working on cleaning up the properties, and can let our Grounds team know about trash. As for the properties, we do need to work on a plan on how to use them long-term.

Q11. We have not heard a progress report on how the common spaces, such as SEEDS and Heirloom will be used.

A. Tina's report at the last Resident Council meeting included a list of the spaces and how they are going to be used. Her report is available in the Resident Council Minutes on Touchtown. Specifically, SEEDS will be turned into a common space for resident use. There is no timeline yet, but we are prioritizing that work. As for Heirloom, there will be an initial "refresh" and the space will be ready for resident use, especially for Food & Beverage events. A longer term project is to fully re-do that space, but there is no timeline for that yet. We chose to redirect some funds from Heirloom to addressing the acoustics in Harvest Grill, which is a priority.

DOG-RELATED

Q12. The yellow house is being leased to Golden Bond, but it seems that property could be put to much better use, rather than leasing it.

A. Our lease with Golden Bond is month-to-month and short-term. It is an opportunity for Rose Villa to capture some revenue while we work on long-term use for that property. It is beneficial to both parties right now. We do need to work on a plan on how to use the properties.

Q13. What about a dog park? Can't the property on the corner of Schroeder and Courtney be used as a better dog park?

A. We are looking at an area that can be turned into a dog park. No timeline yet, but we are definitely pursuing that.
