Regular Meeting: February 4, 2019, PAC

Call to order: Council Chair Eric Shawn opened the meeting at 9:48 AM

Consent Agenda: January meeting notes are approved as published

### Procedural Items (Eric Shawn):

- The Vice Chair position remains empty while we continue to approach qualified residents. Requirements for the position are at least one year of service on a previous Council or presently serving a term on the Council.
- Council will discuss topics before inviting resident participation.

# Reports

Rose Villa Management (Tina Moullet): Garden Grove and North Pocket move-in dates are now scheduled for April. The Oaks will open on February 21<sup>st</sup>.

Enhanced 911 is being evaluated as a means for improving emergency response to independent living apartments. This system will send directions for reaching independent living apartments directly to emergency responders. It will also send info to RV Security. The system will work through RV landlines.

<u>Health Services (Erin Cornell:</u> Several Madrona Grove residents as well as nurses now have the flu, as do some residents in independent living. Erin says we should all wash our hands frequently and use hand sanitizer. Sanitizer stations are located at the Harvest Grill and at the Reception Desk.

The Foundation (Bill Cunitz): Nothing new to report at this time.

Archivist (Jean Coberly): Nothing to report at this time.

# Agenda - New Business

<u>Fall Festival</u>: (Judie Hansen): Judie gave a brief history of the Fall Festival. It's a resident-led, fundraising event to benefit the Foundation. It takes place at the end of the year and competes for funds with another Foundation fundraiser, the Employee Christmas Fund, and the UNICEF drive. Is there resident leadership and energy to continue the event? In 2018 it raised about \$5000.

Discussion followed. Council members asked questions and expressed opinions about the Fall Festival, but none volunteered to take charge of the event. Tina M noted that the larger community enjoys and looks forward to the Fall Festival.

Sponsorship of the Fall Festival will be added to the March agenda as a decision item.

- collaboration! Julia Layden has agreed to join the Executive Committee. Thank you, Julia!
- <u>Communications Committee (Update):</u> Periodic TouchTown trainings will be scheduled. The first is scheduled for Monday, February 11<sup>th</sup> at 1 PM in the Training Room.
- (Dec) \$500 Trees Allocation (Update): (Ron Slusarenko): The Green Team and Josh Pease have created a site plan for new trees on campus. Several varieties have been chosen. The intent is to plant them on Arbor Day.
- Residents Safety Committee (Update): The Safety Committee held its first meeting on February 1, 2019 with eight members present. The purpose of the committee is to facilitate communication about and make recommendations on health and safety issues at Rose Villa. A list of safety issues was discussed, including emergency call systems. The committee has ten members and will meet again on Friday, February 15 at 1:00 pm.
- <u>Council Annual Agenda</u> (Update): Distributed to Council members for review. Work continues on this.
- Internet Upgrades (Update): The Let's Talk report (June 16, 2017) identified
  the wi-fi system as an infrastructure area of prime concern.
  Response: Will McCulley sent an update saying "We have only a few more
  areas to do. We are hoping to be done completely before the end of
  February: units 208-224, 3001-3041 and some external access points around
  Campus."
- Restaurant Seating (Update): The Let's Talk report (June 16, 2017) identified restaurant seating as an infrastructure area of prime concern.
   Response: Norine Mulry, Director of Food & Beverage, distributed a note to residents on January 17 saying eight more seats have been added in Harvest Grill along with seating in the hallway waiting area.
- More Contact with Madrona Grove (Update): In July 2017 the Friendship Corps was designed to create and sustain meaningful relationships for residents in Madrona Grove. In October 2017 Norrene Thompson became the current Madrona Grove representative to the Council. The November 2017 Residents Association survey listed a desire for more contact with residents in Madrona Grove. Lois Weathers, Council Liaison to Madrona Grove, has written a special report describing eight ways independent living residents can have more contact with residents in Madrona Grove. See Attachment #7, also posted on TouchTown under RVRA special reports.

- Resident Concerns Spreadsheet: (Update): Internal tracking mechanism.
   Since August 2016 the Council has addressed 81% of the 286 items brought to the Council. 41% (117) of the 286 are from 2017. 47% (134) of the 286 are from 2018.
  - Suggestion Box: 27% (76) 84% of these are in process or completed
  - Open Forum: 6% (18) 100% of these are in process or completed
  - Let's Talk: 20% (56) 25% of these are in process or completed

53% (150) of the 286 items were brought to Council by Suggestion Box, Open Forum or "Let's Talk". 33% (96) of these items are in process or have been completed.

 (Dec) Extend the sidewalk along River Road between Wild Rose Drive and Willamette View:

Response: RVI response is pending. This typically involves a costly "half street improvement" into the River Road right-of-way and would require removal/relocation of existing Rose Villa trees, landscape and fencing.

 (Jan) Technical suggestion re statistical surveys: No response needed.

# EMPLOYEE CHRISTMAS FUND – ELIGIBILITY SECTION Received from the Finance Dept. November 2018

### Employee Christmas Bonus Calculation Methodology

### Checks to be Distributed: December XXth

- Employees must be employed on December XX<sup>th</sup> to receive a check. (The pay period ending immediately before check distribution date)
- Employees hired after the date we pull the payroll data and run the calculations will receive a flat \$10 check.
- \$ \$10 will be the minimum dollar amount distributed.

# Paragraph approved by Council 12/3/2018

Recognizing the unusual dedication of long-serving employees, any employee who, as of June 1, 2018, is employed at Rose Villa and has been employed at Rose Villa for more than 30 years, is eligible for the 2018 Christmas Fund, whether employed at the end of the year or not. This policy will be in effect whenever such an employee has passed their 30-year Rose Villa work anniversary, in the year in which they may leave employment with Rose Villa. # Proposed Eligibility Section February 2019

- An employee must be employed at Rose Villa on the date the Christmas Fund is distributed.
- All employees are eligible to participate in the Fund.
- An employee is defined as anyone hired by Rose Villa, Inc. for a full-time or parttime position.
- Recognizing the unusual dedication of long-serving employees, any employee who, as of June 1, 2018, is employed at Rose Villa and has been employed at Rose Villa for more than 30 years, is eligible for the 2018 Christmas Fund, whether employed at the end of the year or not. This policy will be in effect whenever such an employee has passed their 30-year Rose Villa work anniversary, in the year in which they may leave employment with Rose Villa. # <u>Great Good Places Agenda Item:</u> Where is Rose Villa's Gathering Place?

From the 2017 Annual Meeting survey to the most recent Let's Talk event, residents have asked for more "unstructured social events." The words used to describe these events vary but they all describe what we remember with nostalgia about the "old lobby" and the "Short Stay Café."

Eric Shawn did some research and learned that Rose Villans aren't alone in looking for these special gathering places. Ray Oldenburg has written a book <a href="The Great Good Place">The Great Good Place</a> about this subject. Oldenburg noted that "... daily life, in order to be relaxed and fulfilling, must find its balance in three realms of experience. One is domestic, a second is gainful or productive, and the third is inclusively sociable, offering both the basis of community and the celebration of it."

Oldenburg identified four characteristics of Great Good Places:

- Great good places are neutral ground where
  - We can come and go as we please
  - No one has to play host
  - We can all feel comfortable and at home
- Conversation is the main activity.
- The best great good places are accessible most any time
  - Usually, we'll find friends and neighbors there
  - Access is easy—we may walk past the location every day
  - Activity is unplanned, unorganized, unscheduled, and unstructured
- Great good places have a low visual profile.
  - The furnishings are comfortable and plain and probably a bit worn

So where is our Great Good Place at Rose Villa? Or, where do we want it to be? Please think about it and share your thoughts with a member of the Council. We will talk about Great Good Places again next month.

**Great Good Places at Rose Villa**

The 2017 survey of the Rose Villa Residents Association included comments from residents seeking more unstructured time together. One year later, gathering places for unstructured time together remain the theme of Ray Oldenburg's book <a href="The Great Good Place">The Great Good Place</a>. He describes four characteristics.

First, great good places are **neutral ground** where individuals can come and go as they please. No one is required to play host. All feel comfortable and at home. Informal relationships form and thrive on neutral ground.

Second, **Conversation** is the main activity. The talk is good. "It is lively, scintilating, colorful and engaging."

Third, the best great good places are accessible almost anytime day or evening with assurance that acquaintances will be found there. Access is easy. Activity is largely unplanned, unorganized, unscheduled and unstructured.

Fourth, great good places tend to have a **low visual profile**. These are usually older places built for other purposes where people can linger in good company. Plainness and homeliness are key features.

In summary, conversation in accessible, neutral places with low visual profile is essential infrastructure for human relationships. These are focal points of community life, locally owned, independent and small in scale.

Let's create community on common ground!

Ray Oldenburg's books <u>The Great Good Place</u> and <u>Celebrating the Third Place</u> can be found in the Rose Villa library.

### "Opportunities for Residents in Independent Living to Connect with Residents in Madrona Grove"

### 1. Suggested ways to volunteer NOW:

- See handout of ideas prepared by Jacque Binder, Activities and Volunteer coordinator for MG. (Attachment 1)
- Peruse monthly Madrona Grove Activities calendar. (Attachment 2) Jacque reports she could use one or two helpers on almost any activity listed. The calendar is posted every month on the bulletin Board outside MG and Jacque will be glad to put one in your cubby if desired. Time commitment is of your choosing.
- Self directed projects—do you have a skill to share? A class you would like to teach? Talk to Jacque and get something scheduled.

### **2.** Opportunities (3) to become trained volunteers:

- Comfort Companions: trained volunteers who sit, in two-hour shifts, with MG residents during their last days or hours of life. Training will be offered once a sufficient number of volunteers have signed up.
- Friendship Corps Volunteers. So far there are nine trained volunteers who help out in many ways in MG ranging from going on outings to taking residents to lunch in the HG. Time commitment is of your choosing. Sign up at the Madrona Grove Open House scheduled for Friday, March 29th, 3:30 to 4:30 pm. An hour long training, if adequate numbers volunteer, will be in mid-April.
- Opening Minds Through Art (OMA). A re-occurring program needing volunteers who assist one-on-one creating art with MG and RV residents who are dealing with physical ailments and memory loss. Each program (and commitment required) is 8 weeks in length. Donations of art supplies are also welcomed.

### 3. Opportunities to volunteer on an on-going regular basis:

- Madrona Grove Bookmobile--a large library cart filled with donated books and magazines guided through MG every two weeks. Volunteers able to push the cart, who love books and chatting with residents, are needed. No record keeping involved. Time commitment averages one hour every two weeks.
- Dear Rosie—answering letters during the school year from 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students.

<u>Green Committee – M Gottschall, W Brown, S Hyne, A Drury:</u> The Green Team resumed meeting after it's holiday break on January 11. At that meeting the working group presented an education proposal for comment. The underlying purpose of the proposal is stated as follows:

Given our knowledge of the Rose Villa community, i.e., that we are a community of strong, shared values, a community that places a high value on our natural environment and a community that has a history of sustainable practices, it is our great hope that our residents will be willing to consider what it means for a vulnerable population of elders to consider "far-reaching and unprecedented changes" in our lifetime.
