- (Aug 2019) Could "buddies" assist new residents for a longer period of time
 - Update: Suggestion forwarded to the Welcoming Committee
- (Sep 2019) When is the new Sunday Brunch menu coming out Response: The new menu came out September 22

- (Sep 2019) Have you thought about a vending machine for snacks and drinks in the Club Room? Would be good when Harvest Grill is closed.
 - Update: Our expected volume is too low to be of interest to commercial vendors. We'll check with F&B staff about other options.
- (Sep 2019) Workers that work the graveyard shift should get paid more than others Update: Human Resources Dept. responded as follows: Rose Villa does offer shift differentials as part of its wage and benefits program. These differentials are determined and defined by each department based on departmental needs. Current departments offering shift differentials include Avencia, Building Operations,
- (Sep 2019) Employee Christmas Fund money should not be allocated to managerial staff Response: The 2019 plan was set in March of this year. The plan for 2020 will be reviewed in early 2020 and the issue will be addressed then.

Security and Environmental Services.

- (Oct 2019) Install a cup rack in the Club Room by the Keurig machine for the convenience of residents who bring their own cups. Update: Tina will check for, perhaps, some cabinet space for storing resident coffee cups.
- (Oct 2019) The Council should advocate for residents who are released from the hospital and need the 5 days in Madrona Grove for continued care but there is no room in Madrona Grove Update: Eligibility requirements for Independent Living Residents who want 5 days of care in Madrona Grove are spelled out in the Resident Handbook. See Health & Wellness, Resident Free Stay Program.

The question about lack of space in Madrona Grove has been forwarded to Health Services for response.

Open Forum

- (Aug) Marilyn Gottschall suggested the Welcoming Committee hold orientation sessions for both new and longer-term residents after Resident forums.
- (Sep) Wes Brown recommended more shade on campus. He reported that unshaded areas like zig-zag walkways can reach 137-

153° F. He suggested that cottages that are shaded would have no need for air conditioning.

Health, Wellness and Safety

<u>Wellness - Rene Swar:</u> In October we celebrate Active Aging Week, which is October 1 - 7. The theme of the week this year is Redefining Active, which I feel we set the bar here at Rose Villa. To celebrate the week, we will again be doing Active Aging Bingo. The bingo card will have a variety of activities to do throughout the week. We will also have some fun special activities such as an obstacle course, badminton, drumming and swim critique and refresher. Mark off your activities and win a prize by getting Bingo diagonally, horizontally or vertically. Bonus prize for Blackout!

<u>Ready Force – Steve Morris:</u> Having completed the most important segments of a core earthquake response plan, we've drafted (and are now reviewing/revising) an 8 page brochure-style Rose Villa Earthquake Response Plan summary document to share with residents. We expect to be ready to distribute this to the community within one to two months.

To help communicate the plan to Rose Villa residents, we are preparing materials for Neighborhood Meetings, using an approach based on the well-established Map Your Neighborhood program. We hope to complete a trial-run of that on a first neighborhood before the end of the year. As part of the preparation for neighborhood meetings, I've prepared neighborhood maps of all of Rose Villa showing residents' names, photos, and contact info here.

Mary is close to finalizing the planned contents for the First Aid and Backup Supplies cache that we plan to provide each Rose Villa neighborhood. She expects to have a prototype cache put together in November so everyone can see what these will actually be.

Community Garden - Jan and Dave Dobak: Produce is being harvested; much has been shared with the Tuesday and Friday Markets. The end of the growing season is approaching.

We have 43 gardeners enrolled. All garden plots have been claimed, and we are working on restoring several plots that have lain fallow for years.

The Saturday work day in September was devoted to improving a pathway in the south end of the Garden.

We continue to meet on the first Thursday each month at 10 am.

Rose Villa Tuesday Market 2019 Season Year-End Report

Tuesday Market is a resident-centered activity designed to share food, build community, and support the Rose Villa Foundation.

A planning session was held in mid May. Volunteers were recruited to fill 33 volunteer roles.

Twenty markets were held in 2019.

- Two Sneak Peak preview sales were held in June
- The Tuesday Market opened July 2; the finale was October 1 (14-week season).
- A new Friday Market was held on four Fridays (August 16 September 6)

For the entire season, a total of \$5,859.42 was donated.

The 2019 Tuesday Market was held outside on the sidewalk along South Main and inside the Club Room. Due to rainy weather, the entire market was held in the Club Room twice.

Market time was changed from "11:00-12:00" to "10:30-11:30 am."

In addition to offering garden produce and baked goods, the Tuesday Market featured...

- Music and the Parade of the Vegetables to launch the Market on opening day
- Music at the opening of every market
- Knife sharpening (with donations split between Tuesday Market and wood shop)
- Information tables by the Green Team (worms bins, electric cars, Climate March, bamboo and recycled toilet paper)
- Information tables from RV groups (knitters, hearing support group, Employee Christmas Fund, Madrona Grove volunteers, sewing cottage and crafters)
- Information tables from community groups and businesses (Milwaukie Environmental Stewards, BeesWax Wraps, and Organics to You)
- Bulk blueberry purchases (for each 10-gallon bucket, \$30 went to farmer and \$10 to Rose Villa Foundation: 76 buckets sold)
- Recipe collection and a cookbook by Recipe Wrangler Caroline Lehman
- Cat grass and homemade dog treats to pamper our furry friends
- Eggs from Marianna Jones' (Madrona Grove) 13 happy chickens
- Craft items (scanner cards by Stephen Weislogel, items from Madrona Grove residents)
- "Nickel Booth"--recruitment by Anne Haynes, and staffed by Vassar Byrd (CEO), Louise Albrecht (RN Care Coordinator), Kristina DeLisle (Environmental Services Manager), Erin Cornell (Director of Health Services), Jennifer Werdel (Director of Marketing and Communications), Jenna Miller (Community Relations Coordinator), Beth Knoll (Courtesy Services Manager), Diane Gibson (CFO), Marty Bracken (Chef), Kathryn Cellerini Moore (Arts and Culture Program Coordinator), and Will McCulley (IT Systems Administrator). Rosie Veeya (a delightful doll who hangs out in the Club Room) used the Nickel Booth for a special feature at the last market--Photos With Rosie. Residents tossed in a nickel (or more), asked questions, and received sage advice.
- Three demos staged outside with Arthur Moore (kitchen gardener), Marty Bracken (chef), and James Carthel (recycling demo)
- Tasting tables with tomato sorbet, fig chutney, zucchini bread, triple brittle, dehydrated tomatoes/raisins/apples/figs, and salmon spread.
- Grape juice (199 pints) from grapes donated by residents (plus a unique stash of grapes growing into the trees on RV's newest property at Schroeder and Courtney)

- Floral bouquets, plants, and trugs (baskets) sold by SEEDS staff
- In the Club Room, a new slide show each week with photos from the previous week and previews of upcoming attractions (many thanks to Rick Simpson for wonderful photographs)

During the peak of the growing season, four additional markets were held in the garden barbecue area on Fridays at noon. Residents were encouraged to bring lunch. Gardeners offered tours of their garden plots.

A rotating crew of 8 Money Counters worked in pairs to tally the proceeds after each Market.

A Blueberry Goddess coordinated the entire ordering/delivery process for buckets of blueberries.

Some volunteers worked behind-the-scenes. "Bag ladies" kept the market supplied with shopping bags. "Pavilion Raiders" borrowed bowls and trays from the Pavilion to display our fruits/veggies. Jack Duren made Nickel Booth signs and the signature flagpole outside the market so even though we didn't see Jack, we saw his handiwork. Ron Rombalski literally "took an axe" to the mega squash donated by the Dobaks and Cathy Schar and sent photographic evidence of his prowess to his grandkids. Ilene McMurray even helped while she was out of state this summer by providing "parking space" for the Nickel Booth in her South Main apartment.

ATTACHMENT #2 Council Safety Committee Report October 2019

Columbia Medical's presentation about Emergency Medical Alert Devices was well received. Emergency Medical Alert Devices are the wearable pendants and bracelets that can be used to summon help in an emergency. Approximately 50 attendees at the September 23 session learned about types of devices available and were able to inspect sample devices that the Columbia Medical rep brought with her. Several attendees commented that the lengthy question/answer session at the end of the presentation was quite helpful.

Wayfinding signage has been discussed at length but is now a less critical issue. Originally, discussion focused on helping emergency responders find their way to resident apartments. Now, the key to getting emergency responders to apartments is RV staff who meet the ambulance and lead it to the resident's apartment.

- This occurs automatically If the 911 call is placed from an RV landline
- If you call 911 from a cell phone, after you hang up with 911 please call the RV front desk or after hours security so RV staff can meet the ambulance and lead it to your apartment

ATTACHMENT #8 Landscape Policy (Wes Brown) Discussion Item

TO: The Administration and the Residents' Council of Rose Villa. RE: A plan to save money, to save energy, and to reduce the urban heat island effects on campus by implementing a comprehensive campus landscaping plan.

I am writing to ask you to take the long view with me when it comes to landscaping at Rose Villa. I mean "the long view" in both a literal and temporal sense. The plants are already pretty much in the ground for Phases One and Two, the Oaks, and Garden Grove. I am pleased that Rose Villa has sought Audubon Certification for these new areas and am pleased that you are considering such landscaping in the Phase Three development as well.

However, there is one thing about the new landscaping to which I want to draw your attention, and that is its relative ineffectiveness when it comes to mitigating the heat island effects produced by the sun hitting the sides of buildings and the side walks. I have been taking temperature readings of sidewalks, in sun and shade, at noon and around 5 PM among the classic cottages, in the view corridor, and in front of North Main. I used the 8:1 infrared thermometer provided by Eric Shawn to take these temperatures and have attached the record of this research to this I've attached the record of this research to this letter.

You will note that there is regularly a difference of 25 to 45 degrees F between shaded sidewalks and unshaded sidewalks around the classic cottages. There are no records for shaded sidewalks in the view corridor because there is nothing growing there that shades them. Temperatures on those sidewalks between 5 PM and 6 PM varied between a low of 121 and 156 degrees Fahrenheit, Noon temperatures on those days varied between 121 and 150 degrees Fahrenheit. These are the times during which residents use the sidewalks and stairs to come to meals. These are times when the black metal hand rails are too hot to the touch or hold on to.

Common wisdom counsels that the time to plant shade trees is 30 years ago wisdom which is impossible to heed in the new developments. It is entirely possible, however, to conceive a long-range plan for the landscape at Rose Villa that contemplates "Central Park at Rose Villa," a marketing strategy that will not betray those residents who moved here because of "the view corridor" - they all will have gone to their further reward.

The economic and environmental value of neighborhoods with significant trees is well documented, aand research supports the healing benefits for patients who can see trees and natural landscapes. (See The Nature Principle, by Richard Louv.) High temperatures are especially threatening to older people (and their pets.) The health and comfort of residents - present and future - as a significant tree canopy matures here, can only enhance Rose Villa as a beautiful, healthy,

environmentally committed community in which to live. The City of Milwaukie has adopted a tree planting program in response to the anticipated ravages attributable to climate change. I recommend that Rose Villa take a similar "long view" as it develops a comprehensive plan for landscaping here.

I say "a comprehensive plan" because putting a tree here and a tree there without consideration of their long-term canopy and environmental virtues - will be a lost opportunity for Rose Villa. Time- gone-by is time lost when it comes to growing trees. Fredrick Law Olmsted had it right when he designed Central Park in New York City and consulted on Forest Park in Portland. I hope for the health. comfort, and safety of residents we can take the long view here as well.

SPECIFICS:

- 1. Direct the Grounds Crew to plant trees along the Classic Cottage sidewalk corridors that will - in time - cast shade on the roof tops and sidewalks of the Classic Cottages, saving energy, saving money, and providing residents greater comfort both in and out of doors.
- 2. Identify sites along the exposed zig-zag sidewalks where shade trees will not impinge on underground utilities. Plant trees that will grow to sufficient size to shade the sidewalks and benches, making this part of campus a haven of shaded walks and gathering places where residents will walk and meet to enjoy the flowering gardens already growing there. Make "Central Park at Rose Villa" a healthful, comfortable, beautiful feature of the Rose Villa Campus in the decades ahead.
- We ask the Rose Villa Residents Council to establish a line item in its budget to which residents and friends of Rose Villa can donate to help support the purchase, planting, and maintenance of "Central Park at Rose Villa." Gifts to this fund could be made in honor of deceased residents, or as expressions of appreciation for Rose Villa's commitment to environmental health and stewardship.
 - Implement this plan in the winter of 2019 and Spring of 2020.

Finally, the Green Team and Bringing Nature Home - having approved this proposal - stand ready to assist with the planning and implementation of this proposal, consistent with Rose Vila's Landscape Policy dated August 1, 2014.
