<u>Clackamas High School's Winter Blitz (Lisa McFarlane & Cindy Rochester</u> Discussion Item See Attachment #5

Lisa McFarlane is a Rose Villa resident and a former high school teacher in the North Clackamas School district; Cindy Rochester is a staff member at Clackamas HS and a coordinator of the Winter Blitz project.

Winter Blitz is a community service project at Clackamas High School and is sponsored by the Key Club. Students, staff, and the community work together to help families in need. The project receives support from local charities and businesses and provides food, clothing, household items, and Christmas gifts to families in need.

Other schools in the district can ask that needy families in their areas be included in the Winter Blitz and donors may specify that donations go to a particular school in their community.

Mission: As an arm of the Council, the mission of the Communications Committee is to build community by:

- fostering clear & effective communication among residents,
- facilitating communications between the Council and the residents, and
- working with RV administration to improve communication with residents.

Current Projects:

- **RV Today**: RV Today is currently a 30 minute online weekly program dedicated to the **growth and health of resident community life.** The <u>objectives</u> are
 - to introduce residents to others they may not know
 - to connect residents across generational and neighborhood boundaries through the use of storytelling and performance.

The programs are produced by Marilyn Gottschall (content) and Steve Morris (technology). Steve is working on a way to offer the audio portion via Amazon Echo. An episode aired each Friday since the last report, and future ones are in the works.

- **Daily Events Summary:** Steve Morris has developed a mostly automated way to collect information on daily events from flyers that are posted online and other sources and produce a very useful summary. This means people don't have to keep track of multiple messages to remember what's going on or how to access it. He is working on finding a way to make it accessible to people with impaired vision. This effort continues to garner kudos from residents, including at the latest Friends without Coffee Zoom session July 23.
- Website: The new website is to be a home for digital imagery and programming that flows from the lives of residents. The development team (Marilyn Gottschall, Steve Morris, Judy Wathen, Cindy Brown, Andrea Drury) has secured a domain name (<u>rvillagers.org</u>) and a hosting account. The team is working on website architecture & navigation and selecting content. Rose Villa Today, which has been playing on Steve Morris' site, has started playing at <u>https://www.rvillagers.org/rvtv</u>. We expect to have an easy-to-use website up and running by the end of August, possibly sooner.

ATTACHMENT #3 Madrona Grove Liaison Report – July 2020

The "Love Parade for Madrona Grove" organized by Kate Dins and held on a sunny day in early June was a huge success! About 20 residents made encouraging colorful signs saying we miss you, we love you, keep smiling, etc., wore silly hats, and accompanied by marching music, paraded outside all the exterior windows of MG while showing off their signs, pantomiming hugs, and showing as much love as possible through the glass to our neighbors and staff inside MG. One parader left a greeting card of encouragement for every MG resident. The hand-made signs were autographed and happily left piled up in the arms of Jacque Binder, Activities and Volunteer Coordinator, and Marianna Jones, Wellness/Movement Coordinator. They used the signs to decorate the halls of MG. Employees sent out words of thankfulness such as, "Thank you for bringing your smiles," "Thank you for supporting the MG team," "You brought such brightness to our day," and "Seeing your love and genuine caring brought tears to my eyes." It was a special, heartfelt event.

The Sunday Ice Cream cart, complete with ice cream music, continues to be immensely popular. Marianna works tirelessly one-on-one with residents to encourage movement activities. For a further taste of some of the events happening in MG, check out the weekly colorful newsletter published by Jacque that is posted on the bulletin board outside MG. It contains jokes, examples of writing projects, and lyrics of the weekly song that is sung together in the hallways every Wednesday and Saturday accompanied on guitar by Jenny Dicklow, Dietary Mgr.

Last month brought the sad death of MG resident, Vivian Scheans, who generously served for a year on the Rose Villa Resident Council as the Representative for Madrona Grove. Vivian lived at Rose Villa for nine years and also was the founding leader of Rose Villa's Weaver's Group. She is greatly missed. The MG Representative position will be left unfilled for the foreseeable future due to the Covid-19 crisis.

ATTACHMENT #4 Madrona Grove Liaison Report – August 2020

The best news this month is that, following state guidelines, visits between residents of Madrona Grove and their friends and families are now happily occurring! Appointments for these loved ones to meet are happening under a tent in the Tranquility Garden. Guidelines include masks and physical distancing which also means no hugging but at least MG residents can now get out of their rooms to see and spend time with their loved ones at long last.

Another new development is the arrival in Madrona Grove of four very realistic baby dolls. Therapy Baby Dolls are found to have a calming influence on residents who have life-long maternal instincts and needs especially during times of loneliness and emotional distress. A baby is a universal symbol of happy, hopeful times, of being needed and useful. Plus, they are fun to dress and play with for staff members too as they use them to interact with those they care for. Jacque Binder, Madrona Grove Activities Coordinator, reports these babies have filled MG with a strong maternal force between both residents and staff and she requests donations of any baby accessories such as clothing, toys, blankets, etc., that you would be willing to give to 4 babies in need. If you have any baby items, call Jacque at x 3276.

Flowers continue to be enjoyed during these summer months. Marion Meyers' daughter is providing weekly flowers for all of MG plus also providing info that can be turned into a weekly horticultural project.

Another highlight of the month was to have the entire Rose Festival Princess Court, in matching yellow dresses, parade by the windows of MG during Spirit Week. Finally, Jacque shares that a small-distanced group is really enjoying watching the RV Today Show together on Friday's.

History of Winter Rage that has Evolved into 2020 Winter Blitz

In 1997 two staff members at Clackamas High School created a community service project to support one family during the holidays. The idea was to do a one day scavenger hunt for a tree, food, gifts, clothes and household items. The Winter Rage Event became a community services project that the entire student body participated in. It has grown to adopting over 200 families and helping over 500 students in the North Clackamas School District. It has evolved into a Key Club Sponsored Event and what we now call Winter Blitz for the 2020 holiday season.

Here is some data from the past few years. 2017 Winter Rage Statistics

- We helped 175 families last year (our goal this year is 200)
 - 441 children under 14 yrs
 - 62 children over 14 yrs

2018 Winter Rage Statistics

- We helped 183 families last year
 - 357 children under 14 yrs
 - 128 children over 14 yrs
 - Total Spent: \$11,641

2019 Winter Range ... 195 families approximately \$17,000 spent

- 418 children under 14 yrs
- 122 children over 14 yrs

What we do:

Everyone in the Clackamas community pulls together to help people who need support during the holidays. It is one of the most positive and exciting events that happen at Clackamas High School. All the kids, staff, and community pull together to help; it is a unifying activity. We have 25 staff members and 250 high school students volunteers from Key Club, National Honor Society, Leadership and the student body who participates in Winter Blitz. Students canvas the Clackamas and Happy Valley communities and ask for donations of clothes, household items, toys, books, bedding and food. On the first Saturday of December we have a Holiday Party where families come to pick up gifts and gently used clothes, toys, games, and household items. Families can bring their children to the Holiday Carnival so that they can "shop" for items they need. When families arrive in the afternoon they are assigned to an assistant who helps them "shop" for items they need. The families with the help of the student assistant fill two bags of clothes and household items all for free.

There are families in tears overwhelmed with gratitude. They share their stories of how they lost their job and this is such a blessing. We hear stories of single parents struggling to take care of their children and this is so helpful. The food boxes that they get makes all the difference in their holiday meals. I heard a story of a single mom who was helped and knows she is giving back to the community because of this experience.
